Presidents Message-




Are you getting to the point that you don't want to turn on the news anymore? Are you tired of hearing about the shoot-

improve traffic flow and make roads more safe and pedestrian-friendly, and is an alternative to making ever wider roads through our neighborhoods. At the same meeting, WCA board voted to ask the city to consider the concept for Montana Avenue. The petition was sent to City

Council, along with the result of our vote. City Council is now addressing the issue in the Economic Development committee.

Tumultuous Smog Season Draws to a Close

Unfortunately, smog season 2007 was one for the record books. The earliest Smog Alert ever issued took place on May 23rd and lasted for four days. The second Smog Alert of 2007 came quickly on the heels of the first – HCDOES issued the alert on

June and July offered a false sense of security, with belowaverage temperatures helping ozone and particulate matter (PM) levels to stay in the good and moderate ranges on the Air Quality Index. But the start of August

kicked off a month of record high temperatures, little rain and abundant sunshine. Two Smog Alerts lasting a total of nine days were called in August. During these Smog Alert days, the 8-hour ozone standard was exceeded six times and PM readings exceeded 40 ug/m³ ten times.

September provided little relief. HCDOES issued a four day long Smog Alert on September 4th. This September Smog Alert recorded six more exceedences of the 8-hour ozone standard and one reading of PM over 40 ug/m³.

To book end the summer, the latest Smog Alert ever issued began on September 20^{th} and ended on September 24^{th} . During that Smog Alert, two monitors registered PM readings over 40 ug/m³.



Although the weather is uncontrollable and aided in the formation of smog this past summer, there are still plenty of actions people can take to reduce the amount of air pollution they produce. Carpooling, riding the bus and riding a bike decrease the number of cars on the road. Conserving electricity saves energy which in turn reduces the amount of coal burned to generate power.

Proper and regular maintenance of automobiles makes them run more efficiently and use less gas.

I Remember When...

I feel certain that there are many folks who still remember the disastrous 1937 Ohio River flood when the crest reached 79.75 feet, just a few feet below the Fourth Street level, in downtown Cincinnati. All bridges to Kentucky were closed, under water. For all practical purposes, Cincinnati was at a standstill. There was no electricity, no water, no public transportation, no water to drink. If you needed water badly enough, you could go to Norwood where they had artesian wells, fill up a few jugs and take them home. We

were lucky at 2886 Harrison Avenue, our home, where we had a cistern in the side yard and which had been covered for many years, not used. It still had about 35" of water in it, not potable but very clear and cold. Neighbors came in to fill jugs. We still had a few gas lights in the house. These fixtures used the mantles which glowed when they were lighted and received gas from the system. We had to go outside to get drinking water but had a coal-fired steam boiler furnace, which did not depend on electricity. We "got by" better than most of our neighbors. Do you remember how trying those days were?

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
