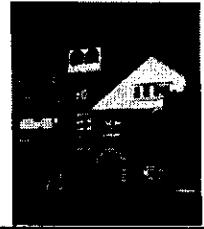

President's Message:

Hopefully, by the time you read this, the temperature will have moderated a bit. It has surely been a long, hot, dry summer in Westwood. But the action never stops in our neighborhood.

We had a great WCA meeting in July. Our new Cincinnati Fire Chief, Richard Braun, made his first community council appearance in Westwood. Chief Braun even brought some family members along with him. He and Firefighters Union President Marc Monahan unveiled plans for the new firehouse near McHenry and Harrison. The chief also described some of the staffing and operational changes he has implemented.



We also had a presentation on the Lick Run watershed project by Dean Niemeyer from the Hamilton County Planning Department. That discussion became somewhat spirited when the issue of adding subsidized housing to this sewer project was raised. You can find information on that project at: www.projectgroundwork.org/lickrun

Charlie Norman from the Ohio Attorney General's office gave a presentation on consumer fraud and scams and how to get help.

A few other items of interest this month-

- We will continue to work with Metro on re-routing the 64 bus, which currently operates mostly empty through Westwood.
- The Westwood Strategic Plan was completed last year. We will be tweaking some items as needed, including adding more accurate neighborhood boundary descriptions and maps. The city is also working on a new comprehensive plan, and we need to make sure that new city-wide plan, as it moves forward, fits seamlessly with our approved plan.
- Don't forget to look for the latest Westwood news on Facebook—just search "Westwood Civic Association".
- Since Westwood is the "Capitol of the West Side", we continue to reach out to surrounding neighborhoods to see where we can work together on common issues such as housing, zoning, transportation and such. John Sess, Karen Strasser and I recently met with East Westwood Improvement Association President Joe Morgan to discuss some of those issues, and how we might work together.
- The Westwood Community Gardens are open for business! Details can be found elsewhere in this newsletter.

Again, I will remind you that when you miss a meeting, you miss a lot. Please try to attend at least the beginning of our meetings. We always try to schedule our speakers and presen-

tations first, and routine (boring?) business last, so you can stay as long as you wish. If you can't make the meetings you can still view the minutes at westwoodcivic.org. And we need everyone to look around the neighborhood and do a little weeding, trash collecting, or whatever you see that needs to be done in our common areas. It would be great if everyone could do a little bit, instead of the same few doing so much. I see some folks picking up litter as they are taking a walk. That's the spirit!

**Get Ready to Get Dirty!
Westwood Community Gardens Has Plots for Rent**

With twenty-two 4'x8' raised garden beds in place and filled with good dirt and with fence installation imminent, the Westwood Community Gardens (2163 Harrison, at the intersection with Talbott) is ready to rent plots for the remainder of the 2011 growing season. Later this summer, we will have even more plots available but we expect these first plots to be snapped up quickly.

Just \$25 secures a plot for this year. Gardeners from the previous year have first selection in the next growing season, so it makes sense to get in at the ground level (no pun intended). The June issue of *Westwords* included an article about the Gardens, focusing on plans for the Gardens' development and on a sizeable grant from Keep Cincinnati Beautiful. In this issue, I'll tell readers about the rules and expectations regarding Gardens use.

Gardeners agree to be good stewards of the Gardens when they apply for a plot. We don't allow pesticides and fertilizers, for example, and we provide the dirt to assure gardeners that they are getting material that is good for their plants and the environment. We expect all gardeners to care not only for their own plots but also for the Gardens, generally.

Everyone who has a plot has to put in 16 hours of maintenance at the site and, believe me, there is plenty of weeding, dirt moving, and clean up to be done. We are documenting volunteer hours at the site as a match for grant funding. Additionally, we know that the more we are invested in the Gardens, the better we'll take care of it collectively. Just like in the Bible, breaking the Gardens' rules

will lead to expulsion. Not surprisingly, that includes behavior like growing illegal or poisonous substances, stealing veggies from others' plots, and bringing dogs, bikes, alcohol, and tobacco into the Gardens. We also expect gardeners to be thoughtful with their plantings; for example, tall bushes or trees that would shade others' plots aren't okay. One benefit of our location is easy access to water. We have a water tap onsite that is unlocked when Gardens' core team members are present. Any homeowner knows that water use costs money, so we ask gardeners to be conservative in their use of water. We encourage gardeners to involve their children and other family members in gardening their plot, as long as the gardener is onsite and responsible. The plot application form lists all of the rules to which gardeners are bound.

Are you ready to get dirty?! You are welcome to stop by the Gardens, particularly on the weekends when we're often working on the next phases of site development. To apply for a garden plot, please contact info@westwoodcivic.org or jenkinswestwood@gmail.com for the application. If we run out of plots quickly, don't worry; we'll put you on a waiting list for the next batch that we're building. 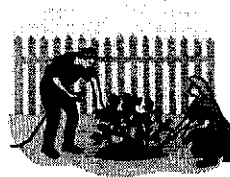

**Profiles of Westwood: Ralph Vanderman
Trent R. Lewis II**

There is an often-told joke about someone's picture appearing in the dictionary as representative of a certain word. While the focus of this article may not be the definition of the word "volunteer," he surely is an excellent model of it. In my involvement with civic matters, I have encountered many people that could easily be described as active in their community. Ralph Vanderman is a man that can be described as a person hyperactive in his community.

A retired Procter & Gamble employee that was involved in designing product packaging, Ralph is usually seen all over Westwood in many roles. Those of you that do not know him will probably be impressed by his level of activity in our neighborhood. Those that do know him will more than likely tell me that I forgot to note some things.

Early on in my civic career, I would see Mr. Vanderman at various meetings and activities involved with the Westwood Citizens on Patrol. Little did I know that this is just the tip of the iceberg for this gentleman's volunteerism.

When a co-worker's wife needed blood, this inspired Mr. Vanderman to create a long-term commitment of becoming a blood donor and relationship at the Hoxworth Blood Center. Ralph organizes blood drives at his local church, as well as other locations. He has also committed himself to a regular schedule of donation for himself. Current Westwood Civic President Jim McNulty has told me that he jokingly greets Mr. Vanderman by asking him, "What do you want from me, blood?"



Ralph also serves as a courier to deliver blood to different hospitals, many times in cases of an emergency. At times, he has had to run blood products to areas outside our region including Hillsboro and Portsmouth. He also represents Hoxworth at various health fairs and donation locations sponsored by businesses and other organizations.

For the longest time, Ralph has waged a one-man war on graffiti in our area. He photographs, categorizes, reports graffiti, and then removes the scribbled vandalism. If he is not equipped for the situation, he contacts the City of Cincinnati department responsible for its removal. Armed with a kit including rags, solvents, various cleaning products and paper towels, he takes

on a multitude of messes using different media on a wide variety of surfaces. His efforts not only preserve our community's quality of life; but also, they save the City money as they are not paying an employee to do the work and saving on clean-up materials. His efforts have inspired a fellow citizen on patrol, Stephanie Smith, to join him on his crusade against this type of eyesore.

Ralph is proud of the work Westwood Citizens on Patrol does, including reporting problems of infrastructure, graffiti, abandoned cars, suspicious activities and unlawful behavior while the group is on patrol.

This gentleman is as active in his church as he is in his community. He and his wife Marge rarely get to go to church together as Ralph arrives early each Sunday to prepare refreshments for the congregation. Once services start, he is still not able to join his wife, as she is usually in the front of the church, and Ralph's work allows him just enough time to get a seat in the back.

For the past five years, I have had the privilege to work with this gentleman at Cincinnati Police Department - District 9's National Night Out. We both man the grills in what is usually very hot weather, so that all those that attend can enjoy free food and drink. While we do not get many "thank-you's" from behind the food booth, I get much reward from working with such a civically dedicated person while we see the fruits of our labors in the faces of our neighbors and others that enjoy the food and get to know their police force.



In the past, Ralph has taken on the following additional volunteer roles:

- Boy Scouts Master, and other scouting related leadership positions
- Sunday School Superintendent
- Volunteer property manager at his church
- Wine-bottling at Henke Winery

Ralph told me that, "Retirement is a full-time job with lots of opportunity for overtime. Being involved in your neighborhood is the most important thing one can do." This positive attitude, combined with what seems like an endless supply of energy, gives our community an outstanding friend, neighbor, and citizen of Westwood. We are very lucky to have such an individual in our ranks.

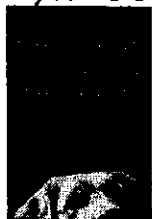

Art of Racing in the Rain by Garth Stein

If you've ever wondered what your dog is thinking, Stein's third novel offers an answer. Enzo is a lab terrier mix plucked from a farm outside Seattle to ride shotgun with race car driver Denny Swift as he pursues success on the track and off. Denny meets and marries Eve, has a daughter, Zoë, and risks his savings and his life to make it on the professional racing circuit. When Denny hits an extended rough patch, Enzo remains his most steadfast if silent supporter. Enzo is a reliable companion and a likable enough narrator, though the string of Denny's bad luck stories strains believability. Much like Denny, however, Stein is able to salvage some dignity from the over-the-top drama.

2011 Household Hazardous Waste Drop-off Program

Take a look around your house—there are likely all sorts of items lingering that shouldn't be thrown away with the rest of your trash. Household hazardous waste (HHW) is defined as leftover household products that contain corrosive, toxic, ignitable, or reactive ingredients. These items can include everything from pesticides to motor fluid—all things most homeowners have around.

Improper disposal and storage of such items can injure family members, waste haulers or and harm the environment. That's why the Hamilton County Recycling and Solid Waste District continues to sponsor a Household Hazardous Waste Drop-Off Program, free and available to all Hamilton County residents. **Please note that locations have changed from last year's program.**

Citizens on Patrol

We are definitely in the dog days of summer! The Citizens on Patrol Program (COPP) curtail their patrols during heat emergencies, however we still manage to get out there for the good of our community.

We have noticed illegal signs are on the rise. During a recent patrol we took down over forty signs in the course of two hours and three streets! Signs on the "right of way" (ROW) are illegal and will be removed. We keep track of repeat violators. If you see excessive signage and would like us to remove them, let us know and we will do so, then report the violators to the district.

At the same time, graffiti seems to be going down, at least in Westwood. In the past year, two people have been caught doing some graffiti. We had the help of two wonderful Westwood citizens who ID'd the offenders. If you see anyone painting a sidewalk or sign, please call the police non-emergency number at 765-1212 immediately. If the police are not able to get to the site on time, please copy down a description, place and time. The best thing you can do is take a picture. COPP would be happy to pass the information on to the police, if you feel you don't want to give your name and/or address. You can remain anonymous.

Just Mow It—No Bagging Required!

Look for Just Mow It! billboards around Hamilton County. For more information about the Just Mow It! Campaign and helpful tips for improving the quality of your lawn, visit HamiltonCountyRecycles.org.

It's no fun to spend an afternoon in the sweltering sun bagging your grass clippings—especially when you don't have to. The "Just Mow It!" campaign, launched by the Hamilton County Recycling and Solid Waste District, is designed to educate the community about proper lawn care in hopes of saving homeowners time and resources.

The concept is simple—when mowing your yard, leave it at that. Just Mow It! advises residents not to bother to bag or rake and dispose of your grass clippings. Contrary to popular perception, grass clippings don't contribute to the formation of thatch (a thick layer of lawn debris that can be unattractive and harmful to lawns). Leaving a layer of grass clippings on your yard actually has many benefits—aside from reducing the time you spend on yard work, you'll also be reducing the amount of waste sent to landfills and providing your lawn with a hearty source of nutrients—up to 1/3 of your lawn's fertilization needs.
