Gamble House Update

In January, Hamilton County Common Pleas Judge Robert Winkler finally rendered his decision from the September 22 hearing. He ruled in favor of Greenacres Foundation saying that the City had no right to deny their demolition permit request for the Gamble house. The word is that the City will appeal. This has not yet been confirmed.

Earlier in January, Cincinnati Preservation Association approached Greenacres with their third offer to purchase the house along with a small parcel of land. It was rejected.

SPEAK YOUR PIECE: FORM BASED CODES! Sr. Ann Rene McConn

The City of Cincinnati is beginning a process called "Form Based Codes. Here's the story. For a long time land use has been regulated by zoning. Form-based codes provide a way to describe what we want to see. They preserve the culture of a community and require that development adhere to the design criteria of the community.

Beginning this spring, residents, business and residential owners, and developers in Westwood are invited to participate in a process of form-based codes for the entire City and specifically for Westwood.

You and your neighbors are all invited to a preview meeting to be held on the evening of March 6, beginning at 6:00 PM to learn how Form Base Codes can promote future business and housing development in Westwood. Save the date! More information will be coming!

Here's the place: 805 Central Avenue. 2 Centennial Plaza. 4th floor.

First, toward the end of March, there will be a 3 day City-wide Charette to develop the basic principles of Form Based Codes for the entire City. Later, in the Fall, four neighborhoods have been selected to have another Charette, in which the principles of the City- wide code can be modified to meet the needs and desires of the respective communities. Those four neighborhoods are Madisonville, Walnut Hills, College Hill, and WESTWOOD! The main street of Westwood – Harrison Avenue from Hansford to the Cheviot line has been selected for the first Form-Based Code plan for Westwood. The main question to answer will be:

"What do you want the street and the buildings to look like?"

Some participants will be more interested in the business district (Kling to the Cheviot line.) Others will focus on the residential district from Hansford to Kling. No doubt that some will be very interested in the area near McHenry.

Your presence is needed on March 6, so please save the date! We'd like to see 100-200 people from Westwood at that meeting. In the meantime, if you are curious – just google Form Based Codes and take a look at what other cities have done to transform their communities using Form Based Codes. More later in the March and April newsletters.

LOCAL WINERY PICKED AMONG TOP 10 IN U.S.A.

Henke Winery in Westwood has been chosen as one of the top 10 urban wineries in America by Food Republic.com, a website that focuses on food, drink, and entertainment throughout the country.

Noting "Cincinnati may be the last place you'd expect to find a winery," the editors at Food Republic selected Henke Winery as its only choice in the entire Midwest. The rest of the top 10 urban wineries are

located in more likely places, including two in the Bay Area of California, two in New York City and two in Portland, Oregon. Urban wineries in Dallas, Seattle and Albuquerque round out the list.

"I'm honored that we've been acknowledged among the best in the country," says Henke. "That's quite a tribute."

Henke is no stranger to awards, having won Ohio's top wine award three times in the past five years, and he has won numerous medals at state, national and international competitions. He bottles 15 varieties and more than 2,500 cases each year, using grapes from Northern Ohio, Upstate New York and California.

Henke Winery, which includes a restaurant that is open Monday through Saturday, is located in the heart of Westwood at 3077 Harrison Avenue, next to iconic Westwood Town Hall.

Benefits of Recycling

Looking for a way to improve yourself this year? Think about trying out a non-traditional resolution. This new year, make the promise to start recycling or become a more frequent recycler.

Recycling benefits both the environment and the economy. The next time you recycle your plastic bottle, aluminum can, or newspaper, remember how you are part of the solution.

Don't believe recycling matters? Check out the statistics.

Recycling Conserves Energy

Using recycled materials as feedstock to make new products saves a significant amount of energy. Here's how much these materials save compared to their virgin counterparts.

- Recycled newspaper uses 40% less energy.
- Recycled glass uses 40% less energy.
- Recycled steel uses 60% less energy.
- Recycled plastic uses 70% less energy.
- Recycled aluminum uses 95% less energy.

Recycling Saves Natural Resources

Using recycled materials means we can log fewer forests, mine fewer metals, and drill for less oil.

- Every ton of newspaper or mixed paper recycled saves the equivalent of 12 trees.
- Every ton of office paper recycled saves the equivalent of 24 trees.
- Every ton of steel recycled conserves 2,500 pounds of iron ore, 1,400 pounds of coal, and 120 pounds of limestone.

Recycling Reduces Greenhouse Gas Emissions

The national recycling rate of 30% reduces greenhouse gas emissions by as much as removing nearly 25 million cars from the road.

In 2010, Hamilton County residents recycled 39,885 tons of metal, glass, plastic, and paper.

The recycling efforts in Hamilton County:

- Conserved enough energy to power 7,080 homes (more than all the homes in Blue Ash and St. Bernard combined!).
- Reduced greenhouse gas pollution equal to every household in Hamilton County not driving their car for a month.
- Saved 344,467 trees from being harvested (almost one for every resident in the city of Cincinnati!).

Recycling Benefits the Economy

Many residents understand the environmental benefits of recycling, but did you know recycling also has economic benefits?

- The recycling industry has a total economic impact of 169,000 jobs and \$6 billion in annual wages, just in the state of Ohio.
- Recycling supplies valuable materials to industry.
- The recycling industry accounts for \$7.3 billion in annual sales, *just in the state of Ohio*.

As a reminder, the following materials are accepted for recycling in the curbside recycling program in the city of Cincinnati:

- all plastic bottles & jugs (remove lids)
- glass bottles & jars, aluminum cans
- steel cans, empty aerosol cans (remove tips)
- newspapers, magazines, and phone books
- brown paper grocery bags
- junk mail, office paper and envelopes
- cardboard (please flatten to conserve space)
- paperboard (i.e., cereal boxes)
- clean pizza boxes (please remove food)






