The City of Cincinnati is receiving in excess of \$25 MIL-LION in Federal dollars to use as blight removal! As all of you know Westwood just LOVES to use these sorts of dollars to remove outdated large apartment buildings and this is no exception! We have invited a representative from The Attorney General's office, Mike DeWine, as well as a representative from the City of Cincinnati to explain how these monies are going to be used and let them know which apartment buildings we want to be torn down.

Come to our next WCA general meeting on Tuesday, March 20, to hear this important conversation.

CPS Superintendent Mary Ronan seemed to like the idea of converting the school to a "School of Choice" or "Magnet School", or whatever you want to call it. But she did say that it would be challenging, and if we want to make it happen, our neighborhood will have to take the initiative. So what say you? And then there is Harrison Avenue. We are starting an initiative to make our main street a more safe and welcoming environment. We are working with CPD Lt. Bauer, and will soon be reaching out to businesses, churches, and social service agencies to tackle some of the ongoing issues






### The History of the Cincinnati Zoo

The Zoo's history is the topic for the March 14 meeting of the Westwood Historical Society. Less than 5 miles from the heart of Westwood (the way the passenger pigeon flies), lies the second oldest zoo in the country. It officially opened its doors to the public in 1875 and has been drawing visitors ever since. It is widely recognized today as a leader in breeding animals in captivity. Learn how the zoo came to be and how the grounds and collection have evolved through the years. Hear about the quirky animals that have lived there and some of the more unusual things that have happened at the zoo like summer opera. The meeting starts at 7:00 pm Note Location: Westwood Library Community Room (enter from lower level in the rear).

### Who turned OFF the lights?

One of the ways that everyone can make Westwood a safer neighborhood is to report street lights that are malfunctioning (flickering on and off) or burned out. In order to get it repaired, you will need to know the street address where the light is located and the pole number. Most telephone poles in Westwood have a metal plate with a



pole number. Once you have the address and the pole number, you can either call Duke Energy at 1-800-544-6900 or fill out an online form at <<u>www.duke-energy.com/north-carolina/outages/streetlight.asp</u>>.

Research has shown that there is a correlation between street lighting and crime. Brandon Welsh, a criminology professor at Northeastern University, has found that street lights act as a "natural surveillance" and can reduce crime up to 20%. When the city of Oakland, California tried reducing the glare from street lights by using energy-efficient bulbs and capping new lamp posts to prevent light from flooding the skies, the homicide rate increased by 25%. If you want a safer Westwood, at night make sure that your street lights and porch light are ON!

### Yard trimmings drop-offs reopen March 31

Look around your backyard. Your leaves, old shrubs, branches and brush aren't landfill material. They can be used to create valuable compost and recycle nutrients back into Hamilton County yards. To help you recycle your yard trimmings, the Hamilton County Recycling and Solid Waste District's Yard Trimmings Drop-Off Sites will reopen on March 31, 2012. As always, this service is free to Hamilton County residents. Approximately 7,000 tons of yard trimmings were collected last year.

### Dates and Hours:

March 31 — November 25, 2012 Saturdays and Sundays 11:30 a.m. — 5 p.m.

January 5 and January 12, 2013

Saturdays Noon — 3 p,m,

All sites will be closed on April 8.

### Locations:

WEST:

Kuliga Park, 6717 Bridgetown Rd., Green Township

### NORTH:

Rumpke Sanitary Landfill, 3800 Struble Rd., Colerain Township

#### Guidelines:

Landscapers and commercial establishments are NOT eligible to participate in this program! No large trailers or trucks larger than pickups.

Cut brush and tree branches into lengths of 4 feet or less branches must not exceed 1 foot in diameter.

Bundle brush and tree branches with a material such as twine—bundles must not be heavier than 50 pounds.

Bring yard trimmings to the locations in containers of bags—brown paper bags preferred.

Containers and plastic bags will be returned.

No pallets, boards, nails, fence or wire accepted.

Hamilton County residents only: All children must stay inside vehides.

If you're unable to haul your yard trimmings to one of the locations, why not try backyard composting? Visit our website, Hamilton-CountyRecycles.org, for details about how to get started with backyard composting and outlets where you can purchase bins. 


