Westwood Citizens On Patrol Celebrates 15th Anniversary



Westwood Citizens on Patrol marks its 15th Anniversary this month. Members will celebrate with an annual meeting and banquet at Henke Winery with Mayor John Cranley as guest speaker. That evening members will receive certificates with the number of hours they have patrolled during the past year, and a special award, the "golden grabber," will recognize the member who has shown extra effort. In honor of this anniversary and milestone, a brief history of Westwood's unit follows.

Founded in February 2001, Westwood Citizens on Patrol began out of Westwood Concern, a grassroots, neighborhood organization founded by Melva Gweyn and Mary Kuhl.

At one of Westwood Concern's early meetings, Mary suggested that the time had come for Westwood to join the citywide Citizens on Patrol program. She asked for volunteers who might be interested in participating. That evening two residents responded that they would be willing to form a unit here in Westwood.

After background checks and twelve hours of training at the Cincinnati Police Academy, sixteen Westwood residents began patrolling. Acting as extra eyes and ears of the Cincinnati Police Department, members never

get involved, but radio in to the police what is seen and heard. On our very first patrol, we addressed issues small (a neighborhood collie with a fishing lure stuck in its hind leg) and large (a car break-in in progress). Of the original sixteen members, five are still volunteering today.

Since that first walking patrol, Westwood Citizens on Patrol has expanded its reach to include stationary patrols, bicycle patrols, and vehicle patrols. All patrols result in written reports that are shared with police personnel. We address both quality-of-life issues (illegal dumping, downed stop signs, abandoned vehicles, burned-out streetlights, etc.) and crimes-in-progress (hit-and-run accidents, domestic violence, drug dealing, assaults, truancy, etc.). Four members have received official commendation for radioing in a detailed description of the perpetrator of a shooting, which led to an arrest and a conviction.

Westwood members also regularly participate in service projects, such as litter pickups of the I-74–Montana Ave. interchange, clearing Westwood's hidden walkways, bringing plates of cheer to District 3 officers for the "12 days of Christmas," participating in the Harvest Home Parade, holding "long-walk cleanups" of Harrison Ave., marching in the Cincinnati Police Memorial Parade, and scheduling round-the-clock patrols for four days when a member's home burned.

The 91 Westwood residents who have served Citizens on Patrol defy stereotypes. The youngest member has been 18, and the oldest 88. The political spectrum has ranged from Tea Party members and Republicans to Democrats and ultra liberals. Of the five Civilian Coordinators who have led the unit, three have been women and two have been men. Our membership has been and continues to be enriched by race, ethnicity, class, disability, gender, and sexual orientation. The unit truly represents a cross section of the neighborhood: from apartment dwellers to homeowners, from restaurant bussers to business owners, and from Westwood natives to out-of-state newcomers.

As a civilian unit of the Cincinnati Police Department, we have worked closely with police personnel from District 3. Today, our patrols are governed by crime patterns and Captain Gerard's weekly briefings. We are part of the wider strategy of Community-Oriented Policing, promoting organizational strategies, systematic partnerships, and problem-solving techniques. Our patrols also serve as deterrent, preventing crime from happening by our presence on neighborhood streets, business corners, and shopping plazas.

Since the beginning our unit has had a simple motto: "Get involved. Stay involved. Make a difference." In the past fifteen years, Westwood Citizens on Patrol has made a difference, both by empowering its members and in improving our neighborhood. As we look to the future, our effectiveness could be increased with even greater participation. If you are interested in joining Westwood Citizens on Patrol, please e-mail our unit and

President's Message-

Crime and Zoning have been front and center this month. First-Crime.

On February 16, the WCA public safety committee along with Westwood COPP representatives met with Cincinnati Police Chief Jeffrey Blackwell and District 3 Captain Dan Gerard. We had a very good discussion about many issues affecting Westwood, including:

- High overall crime and perception of crime.
- House break-ins.
- Thefts from autos.
- Lack of enforcement of the Chronic Nuisance Ordinance.
- Constant "Code Zero" issues, where there are no officers to respond to calls.
- Lack of follow through and investigations of reported property crimes.
- Lack of "police visibility" on the streets, due to officers chasing calls for service.
- Drug dealing and associated violence.
- Juvenile truancy and curfew issues.
- Problems with the call center and "customer service" issues.

Chief Blackwell seemed to be genuinely interested in working on some of these issues. We also discussed the new police recruits, and the need for most of them to come to district three.

Captain Gerard attended our February meeting the next night, and we discussed these issues at length.

We will follow up with Chief Blackwell, and continue to work to systematically reduce the crime problems.

Zoning-Bill Spetz and the zoning committee have been meeting almost every week, and are making headway. Maps of zoning change suggestions for two large sections of Westwood were presented to WCA. The board approved them, and the city is now digesting the information. The requested changes are mostly to reduce density of housing; that is, more single family zoning, and less (or less dense) multi-family zoning. The various business districts will be slated for mixed-use "walkable" development. This is a potential problem area, as it seems that all newly proposed commercial zoning categories allow multi-family development. This could hurt Westwood in our goal to achieve 60% single family home ownership. We need to ask the city to create a "clean" commercial zoning option without the burden of additional multi-family housing. The committee also decided not to touch the recently adopted "Form Based Code" areas of Westwood. Thank you to Bill and the team for working tirelessly to try to make some sense out of the new zoning scheme.

While we're on the topic of zoning, you probably know that I am not a big fan of Form Based Codes or other high density zoning for Westwood. Westwood's roots are suburban, not urban. The very reason Westwood became so popular in the early days was that it was a refuge from the crowded, noisy, smelly, crime-ridden urban environment downtown. We have been working to reverse the blight and crime issues resulting from ill-conceived high density zoning decisions made in Westwood decades ago. I don't know how most folks in Westwood feel, but I know that many of the people who show up to meetings recently are enamored with the city's "New Urbanist" plans for Westwood. It's sold as something new, but is really just remaking the same mistakes and expecting different results. High density multi-family development is the flavor of the day in the City Planning Department, and if folks don't object, it's what we will get. Short term excitement then long term decline.

The question many have asked when they see all those sideways apartment buildings slid in between single family homes along Harrison Ave is- "What were those people thinking about years ago, and why did they let these destructive zoning changes happen?" You don't have to wonder—just go to a meeting or two. It's happening all over again right now.

That's how I see it. You might hope it's going to just go away or maybe "not be too bad". If you don't get involved, you will be disappointed with the results of the "new" old zoning schemes being promoted right now. And 50 years from now, people will be wondering what the heck we were thinking...

And now here's something we hope you'll really like! Come join us March 17 for the WCA annual meeting/dinner at Henke Winery. (Details pg. 1) I promise that the meeting portion of the evening will be minimal, and that dining and conversing with neighbors will be the priority. This will be a good opportunity for you to meet your new board members.

On April 21 during our regular meeting, The newly elected WCA board will vote for its officers for the coming year.

I hope you took the time to read the excellent Citizens on Patrol article by bruce mcclung on page 1. And I hope you will consider joining Westwood COPP. It takes just a small commitment of time, and gives a large return—both for our neighborhood and you. Important mission, great friendships, and we really do have a lot of fun—honest! Think about it, won't you?

I Remember When ...

In the summer of 1927, when standing in the garden of the family home at 2886 Harrison Avenue, I was startled by the sound of a very low-flying airplane. Airplanes were not too common in areas not near airports in those times, so we paid particular attention, people coming out of their houses, pointing into the air and shouting "airplane". It appeared that the plane was looking for a place to land; it was just overhead, very




